# **BEST EVER RESULTS BRING CHEER** FOR PUPILS

#### UPILS South across Lanarkshire are celebrating unprecedented success in this year's exams.

The council's Executive Director of Education, Jim Gilhooly, said the results were "the best ever achieved by young people right across national and vocational qualifications".

The pass rate for all Highers was an impressive 77 per cent and at Advanced Higher the figure was even better with an 81 per cent success among pupils.

National 4 and 5 results were also higher than the previous year, with 95 per cent and 81 per cent pass rates respectively.

Mr Gilhooly added: "I'd like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the hard work that has helped deliver unprecedented school exam success across South Lanarkshire.

"The hard work of pupils and the support of their parents and carers were key in this success, and we acknowledge the efforts of our teachers and school support staff, who prepared our young people so well for their courses, assessments and qualifications system.

"This set of results shows our schools are equipping our young people with the skills, experience and attributes they need for the world of work or further study."

qualifications and awards. "It is a reward for all their hard work and periods of study and the support provided by our teachers."

Breaking down the results even further, for the first time more than 30 per cent of sixth year pupils finished their school career with five or more Highers.

The performance of fifth year pupils further enhanced the magnificent set of results, with 57 per cent achieving one or more Highers.

Mr Gilhooly added that even if some pupils had not received the results they had hoped for, they should remain positive.

He said: "Exam results are important but they need to be considered in the

context of the development of a range of skills and competencies as these are also important factors in enabling young people to enter the world of work or to move into further or higher education.

"While the majority will receive the grades they were hoping for we should also remember that even if there has been some disappointment there is always support and guidance on hand to help everyone build on their achievements in a positive way."

Among those celebrating success were twins Fraser and Sophie Allardyce.

The 17 year old Cathkin High School pupils achieved a total of 10 Highers with Fraser gaining straight As in Maths, Physics, English, Biology and Graphic Communication and Sophie As in English, Maths, Music and Art and a B in Biology.

Depute Head Teacher Kevin McConnachie said: "As a school we are very pleased with our pupils performance in this year's exams and the results are testament to the hard work put in throughout the year.



"Fraser and Sophie undoubtedly benefitted from our Higher Mentor programme which is designed to allow teachers to work with small groups of pupils through the year to help keep them on course to achieve the best results they can."

The twins are staying on at Cathkin for their sixth year, each sitting a further two Highers and one Advanced Higher.

Fraser, who is aiming for a career in

engineering, said: "The academic pressure will be a little lower this year and I am looking forward to the challenges of taking on the leadership roles within the school that are expected of senior pupils."

Sophie, who plans to go to art school and study design, said: "I think we both feel the mentor programme was a real help throughout the year. We studied hard and the support ensured we stayed on track."

OUTH Lanarkshire Council have launched a new campaign, Find 40 Families, to encourage our residents to consider adopting children who can no longer live with their birth families.

The campaign, with a target of finding 40 adoptive families in the next 12 months, is backed by Councillor Lynsey Hamilton, Depute Chair of Social Work Resources and member of the South Lanarkshire Fostering and Adoption Panel.

She said: "I am delighted to support this campaign which would mean that 40 babies or children would be matched with their forever family in the next 12 months.

"Adoption is an option for many different family make-ups and indeed for single people.

"There's a myth that there are all sorts of barriers to adoption and this is not the case.

"We aim to make the process as smooth as possible for applicants, with a view to ensuring that children get their loving home as quickly as possible. And all you have to do to start the process is request an information pack."

The council is looking for enquiries from single people, couples, families who

have children of their own, and same sex couples who have been living together for more than two years.

All applicants must be over 21 years of age and should be able to parent a child until adulthood.

Once you have received your

information pack, a social worker will call to arrange a visit, at a time that suits you, to discuss the process further.

If you do decide to progress you will be invited to preparatory groups where you will be given more information and have an opportunity to ask more questions.

Following the preparatory groups, you will be asked if you wish to proceed. A social worker will be allocated to undertake an assessment of you and your family. They will support you through the process and will discuss their recommendation to the Adoption Panel with you. South Lanarkshire Council also offers a range of post adoption supports to adopters.

# VOTERS REMINDED TO REGISTER

SOUTH Lanarkshire residents are being urged to ensure they register to vote.

Household Enquiry Forms (HEF) are being sent out to each home as the annual voter registration canvass gets underway.

Residents should complete the form issued to them and return it as

soon as possible to ensure that they will remain on the electoral register and are able to vote in any future elections.

It is essential residents check that their details are correct, amend these details where necessary and send the form back.

Households are encouraged

to use a freephone service if their details have not changed, or the online facility where there are changes. The use of these services not only makes confirming details easier, it also saves money compared to the costs of returning the paper form through the post.

This year's canvass is again

looking to capture the details of young persons who will be 16 by 30 November 2017 – details are contained within the form.

Residents are also being reminded that credit reference agencies use the electoral register as a check when assessing credit applications. Therefore if people are not on the register, their ability to access credit may be affected.

Please note that a fine up to £1000 may be imposed for failing to supply the information.

## Mental health project to be piloted in Lanarkshire

A NATIONAL mental health project that seeks to deliver an 'ask once - get help fast' service for people in distress is to be piloted in Lanarkshire.

Known as Distress Brief Intervention (DBI), staff across a wide range of agencies will be trained to help people in distress manage difficult emotions and problem situations at the earliest possible stage.

People will then be supported to overcome their immediate challenges and develop ways to look after their well-being, preventing future distress.

The Minister for Mental Health, Maureen Watt, announced that Health and Social Care North Lanarkshire (H&SCNL) and South Lanarkshire Health & Social Care Partnership (SLH&SCP) have been selected to host the national DBI team on behalf of the Government. The Lanarkshire partnerships will also join four other partnerships across Scotland as a test site for the programme.

General Manager for Mental Health and Learning Disability Services in Lanarkshire, Paula Macleod, said: "The aim of DBI is to listen, learn, understand and share how we can provide more coordinated, consistent and compassionate responses to people who experience distress across Lanarkshire and Scotland.

"We want to do this in a way that really makes a difference to people's lives, their families and friends."

Harry Stevenson, Chief Officer of SLH&SCP said: "This initiative will help ensure there is no wrong door for those in distress, whether they approach social work, health or partner organisations such as the police or ambulance service.

"The DBI will build on the well established spirit of joined up, coordinated working, placing the person at the centre of everything we do."

OUTH Lanarkshire's Danielle Timmons has been named 'Teacher of the Year' at the prestigious Scottish Education Awards 2016.

The 30-year-old, Depute Head at St Vincent's Primary School in East Kilbride, impressed the judges ahead of two other finalists, both from the secondary school sector. She will now go forward to represent Scotland at the UK finals in London in October.

But no-one holds her in higher esteem than her colleagues of nine years at St Vincent's who describe her as "both exceptional and unique".

Head Teacher, Eileen Tompkins, said: "Put simply, Danielle is an example to us all, she has a 'why not' attitude that sees her go above and beyond on behalf of the children and the school community.

"For example, we are the only school in Scotland to be in the final for the Rolls Royce science prize, our choir has grown from strength to strength and we have moved on leaps and bounds in terms of

# Buildings improved by CARS scheme

IMPROVEMENTS to several buildings and notable landmarks in Strathaven can now get underway thanks to a £625,000 Conservation Area Regeneration Scheme.

Earlier this year Historic Scotland (now Historic Environment Scotland), announced that an award had been made to South Lanarkshire Council, which will be invested in a conservation project in Strathaven.

Since the announcement, which was preceded by a comprehensive consultation

process within Strathaven, preparation for the active phases of the project has been underway.

South Lanarkshire Council working alongside local community representatives, will act as project managers on behalf of the initiative and a further round of surveys of shop fronts will be undertaken in preparation for consultation with shop occupiers/owners.

Chair of South Lanarkshire Council's Enterprise Services Committee, Councillor Chris Thompson, said: "I am delighted that we have secured this funding which will improve many of the buildings and public realms within the Strathaven Conservation Area.

"The training and skills in classical repair application will also, I am sure, be very useful to those people who are identified to take part in that programme."

Jennifer Storrie, Project Manager for Historic Environment Scotland, said: "When awarding CARS funding, our priority is to support projects focussing on the wider contribution the historic environment brings to communities.

"We are delighted to be providing £625,000 of funding to South Lanarkshire Council over the next five years, enabling them to deliver this project which has strong support from the local community who wish to see the town's heritage safeguarded for the future."

# EMPLOYERS BOOSTED BY COUNCIL SUPPORT

N industrial welding firm in Cambuslang has almost doubled its workforce in just two years with the backing of South Lanarkshire Council's business support service.

In addition to going from a staff of 13 to 23 Walkerweld Engineering also increased turnover by around 50% from 2014-2016 and launched a new apprenticeship scheme creating opportunities for local young people.

South Lanarkshire Council played a key part in the company's remarkable story providing business support grants totalling £31,275.

Well established and offering highly skilled and highly specialised expertise in welding, fabrication and plant repair services to diverse industries including rail, construction and marine, Walkerweld, as with many others across Scotland and beyond, was hit by the slump facing the oil industry.

Manager Jim Stevenson, a past president of the Scottish Rugby Union, came out of retirement two years ago to join Walkerweld. He said: "When I started I immediately saw that we had a lot of strength in the team and a little slack in a usually full order book that gave us the opportunity to diversify quickly and allow the business to thrive. That is when I first approached South Lanarkshire Council's Business Support Team and their help has been incredible."

Since 2014 Walkerweld has put a total of £122,000 into recruitment, training, equipment and workplace improvement and expansion, with South Lanarkshire Council supporting an investment that has created 10 new engineering jobs in Cambuslang. It

has also launched a new apprenticeship programme and the opportunity for more as the company continues to grow.

Councillor Chris Chair Thompson, of the council's Enterprise Services committee, said: "Walkerweld had come to us for support with a vision of how the business could grow. Our Business Support Team had the knowledge and expertise to deliver the right support to benefit them as a business and the community by creating jobs and opportunities.

OUTH Lanarkshire Council has supported investment and job creation at an East Kilbride recycling plant to the tune of £20,000.

Highlander International are Scotland's largest independent paper recycler, located on the former site of John W Hannay in the town's Linwood Avenue, and supply a broad range of markets across the UK and mainland Europe, for the re-processing of recovered materials.

Now, thanks to a tie up with the council's Business Support Team, the company has been able to access grants and financial support enabling them to invest in bigger and better infrastructure, and create new iobs.

Indeed business support grants totalling more than £20,000 in the last three years have enabled Highlander International to increase turnover and profitability and create employment opportunities – as many as eight new posts by the end of 2016.

Managing directors Brian Bingham and Stephen Duffy first approached the council in 2013 when they were looking to invest a six figure sum in new equipment.

Explained Brian: "At this point we were proposing a significant investment in the plant, in East Kilbride and in the local job market, so naturally the council was our first stop when seeking advice and support.

"The time, expertise and financial help given to us by South Lanarkshire was invaluable. With their support we were able to invest in areas such as building improvements, employment and training. East Kilbride has in the past played a major part in the paper recycling industry, and we are proud to bring this back to the town, offering local business a reliable service for all types of paper recycling."

Councillor Chris Thompson,

Chair of the council's Enterprise Services committee, called Highlander's partnership with the council, a true success story.

He added: "There is so much to be gained from working with us, on both a financial and practical level, and the year-onyear investment and job creation at Highlander International is testament to that.

"I would urge as many business as possible – big or small – who are already operating in South Lanarkshire or are keen to locate here, to get in touch."
